TOPIC (NASTAVNA JEDINICA): Saints and sinners MODULE 2, LESSON 2b – LISTENING AND SPEAKING – Pinkerton's National Detective's Agency – Kate Warne – The First Female Detective (page 18)

AIMS (CILJEVI I ZADAĆE)

- Students practise listening skills, answer the questions and order the events in the life of the first female detective
- Students acquire new vocabulary and learn new things about the development of Pinkertons detective's agency and the first female detective in America

LEARNING OUTCOMES (ISHODI):

- students can understand the listening task about detectives and solve different tasks working in pairs and individually
- students can use new vocabulary and expressions connected with the topic of detectives
- students can discuss and express their opinion connected with the topic of detectives

LESSON STRUCTURE (ARTIKULACIJA SATA)

INTRODUCTION

BEFORE YOU START (5 minutes)

- The teacher introduces the topic of detectives and asks students to match famous detectives with the TV series or films they star in (look at the blackboard plan)
- The students work in pairs in order to match the detectives with their corresponding films or TV series
- The teacher checks the answers with the students

VOCABULARY WORK (10 minutes)

- The teacher introduces and pre-teaches new vocabulary to the students (look at the blackboard plan)
- Students then use new vocabulary in order to describe one female detective discussed in the previous activity. The students write down their answers
- Students present their descriptions of the chosen detective

SEQUENCES

I. EXERCISE 1: SPEAKING (5 MINUTES)

- The teacher asks the students to look at the first task in their book and answer the questions
- The teacher checks the answers with the students

II. EXERCISE 2: LISTENING COMPREHENSION (5 MINUTES)

- The students listen to a story about Kate Warne
- The teacher checks the answers with the students

III. EXERCISE 3: LISTENING COMPREHENSION (5 MINUTES)

- The students listen to a story about Kate Warne again
- The students order the events in Warne's life
- The teacher checks the answers with the students

IV. EXERCISE 4: SPEAKING (5 MINUTES)

- The students answer the questions
- The teacher checks the answers with the students

<u>CLOSURE</u>

EXERCISE 5: EXTRA ACTIVITY 1 (DISCUSSION) – OPTIONAL (can be set as homework)

Students are given two statements to discuss in groups

- 1. Detective stories (books, films, plays, TV series) have been popular for over 150 years. Why do you think people enjoy them so much?
- 2. 'The greatest detectives are typically eccentric loners.' To what extent do you agree with this statement? Why do you think it might be an advantage to be a loner if you are a detective?

Their answers are then discussed with a teacher.

Glossary:
